
AUGUST 2020




The above graph reflects the total reported incidents per month since August 2016.

We are pleased to note that whilst increases in crime incidents seem to be the norm in adjoining areas currently, Observatory has noted a decrease in the number of reported incidents this month – coinciding with the OBSID deployment of a third vehicle from the 27th July 2020.

August 2020 shows a significant reduction to the lowest reported level this year (excluding the first month of hard lockdown - level 5 – April 2020)..

SUMMARY:



AUGUST 2020

For the period 1-31 August 2020 there were 67 incidents reported compared to 83 incidents the previous month. The decrease of reported incidents may be attributed to the deployment of our third public safety vehicle, enabling more interruptive patrols in the different sectors.

Thefts recorded the highest number of incidents (44), 13 of these being opportunistic thefts where metal post box covers and door handles were stolen.

On the 20th of August 2020 L/Col. Van den Berg of SAPS visited the OBSID office for a crime brief. Information was shared between SAPS and the public safety officers resulting in a scrap metal dealer being identified as a business of interest to SAPS. On the 21st of August 2020 the public safety team arrested two suspects who were in possession of such items – probably as they could no longer get rid of the scrap metal. To date, no further incidents of this nature have been reported.

26 of the theft incidents were vehicle related, broken down as follows – theft of motor vehicle (4), theft out of motor vehicle (6), attempted theft out of motor vehicle (2), theft of motor cycle (2), theft of car parts (10) - 8 vehicle batteries, 1 set of hubcaps and 1 wiper blade and (2) attempted thefts of motor vehicles.

Other theft related incidents were (1) attempted theft, (3) theft of bicycles and (1) theft of cell phone.

Robberies recorded (8) incidents, 1 more than July 2020.

Other reported crimes were malicious damage to property (1), housebreaking (5), housebreaking business (2), trespassing (5), shoplifting (1) and assault common (1).

Pro-active engagement (e.g. reports of suspicious activity / persons / vehicles) from the community is down compared to the previous month (5 reports as compared to 20 received by the Control Room during July 2020).

An easy way to improve this would be for more people to download and use the Buzzer App. Buzzer links directly with the OBSID control room via the app (most of the ObsWatch groups aren't linked to our control room) as well as neighbours and people nearby – alerting everyone to your need for assistance or to the incident you are reporting.

The OBSID public safety team are having to inform owners or residents of unlocked vehicles, open doors, and open garages or premises gates. OBSID's public safety team recorded 112 proactive incidents this month compared to 80 proactive actions last month.



Public safety and SAPS deployment are dependent on incidents that have been reported. Community involvement in reporting both suspicious incidents as well as actual crimes are imperative as law enforcement alone cannot reduce crime without involving the communities for information.

Quick reporting to SAPS of incidents in progress by the public safety team resulting in **11 arrests** being made during the month:

TOTAL INCIDENTS BY CATEGORY AND MAP:





Vehicle related theft;










INCIDENTS BY DAY:




INCIDENTS BY TIMES OF DAY (AS REPORTED):




Sector analyses:


- OBS Red 1, recorded (9) incidents against 19 reported the previous month: (1) theft of motor vehicle, (1) general theft, (1) attempted theft out of motor vehicle, (2) theft of car parts, (1) theft of bicycle, (1) attempted robbery, and (2) trespass.
- OBS Red 2, recorded (13) incidents against 9 reported the previous month: (1) theft of motor vehicle, (4) general thefts, (1) attempted theft, (1) theft of car parts, (1) theft of bicycle, (1) attempted theft of motor vehicle, (1) robbery common, (1) armed robbery, (1) malicious damage to property and (1) trespass.
- Blue 1, recorded (6) incidents against 9 reported the previous month: (2) theft out of motor vehicles, (2) general thefts, (1) attempted theft out of motor vehicle and (1) theft of car parts.
- Blue 2, recorded (7) incidents against 14 reported the previous month: (1) attempted theft of motor vehicle, (1) common assault, (2) common robberies, (1) armed robber, (1) shoplifting and (1) trespass.
- Blue 3, recorded (8) incidents, against 6 reported the previous month: (2) general thefts, (1) theft of cell phone, (2) theft of car parts, (1) robbery common and (2) housebreakings and theft.
- Orange recorded (12) incidents against 17 reported the previous month: (2) theft of motor vehicles, (3) theft out of motor vehicles, (2) general thefts, (1) theft of car parts, (1) attempted robber and (3) housebreakings (the same house broken into from the railway line side homeowner needing to secure property).
- Yellow recorded (11) incidents against 9 reported the previous month: (2) general thefts, (3) theft of car parts, (2) theft of motor cycles, (1) theft of bicycle, (2) housebreakings business (same building) and 1 trespass.
- Green recorded (1) incident up from last month: (1) theft of motor vehicle.

INCIDENTS BY STREET:

The incidents were scattered throughout the area. Streets that recorded more than one incident were not on the same day and occurred on separate days throughout the month. The visibility by the public safety officers is making it more difficult for perpetrators to commit offences hence the increase in opportunistic crimes and decrease in property related crimes.

SUMMARY:

As mentioned in this report the OBSID public safety team are having to inform owners or residents of unlocked vehicles, open doors, and open garages or premises gates. OBSID's public safety team recorded 112 proactive incidents this month which relates to 112 potential victims of crime. Not only does this pose a risk for crime but easy targets can attract more perpetrators to the area.

Cooperation between SAPS and the public safety officers is continuously improving. The public safety supervisor reports on duty at the Woodstock police station at the beginning of every shift where incidents are discussed with the shift commander – providing real time information to SAPS as regards incident trends that might not have been reported to them by complainants.
